Please send your dues ASAP. Your dues are essential to enable us to pay the rent! Remember our ONLY source of income is from dues and donations.

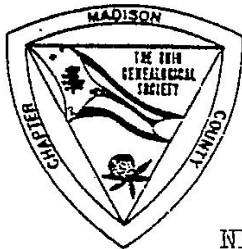
GENEALOGY TIP

Back up your records regularly

You never know when your computer hard drive is going to crash or succumb to disaster or theft. Back up your digital genealogy files and photos at least once a month—and immediately after you make a lot of additions or changes to your files. Save copies to an external hard drive and to a second medium that is in a physically different location from your original files and primary backup,

A good option for that second medium is activate an automated cloud backup service such as Apple iCloud, Backblaze, Carbonite, or SugarSync. Mac users can go with Time Machine or Mac Carbon Copy Cloner. Or check out Backupmytree.com which will automatically back up your GEDCOM or most genealogy computer program files for free.

Michael Charles Ryan, was born in County Tipperary, Ireland, 83 years ago last November, and emigrated to this section when quite young. He was married at South Charleston some forty years ago to Mary Gilmartin, who died about 15 years ago. For a time they lived in Fayette county. He was the father of 12 children, three of whom died in infancy. For 12 years he was a faithful sexton of St. Patrick's church, London, until his age prevented him from performing the duties, since which time he has been making his home with his son, John, in Columbus, and his daughter, Mrs. John Eichenlaub, Springfield. He is quite spry for his age and enjoys fair health, good eyesight and memory. His mother, Mrs. Winifred Ryan, lived to be over 90 years old. Mr. Ryan has always been temperate in his habits. He is known and respected throughout Madison county.

UNION

Henry Kilgore, aged 80, was born in Madison county, on the Herrod farm, near South Solon, Sept. 14, 1828. He has always lived in Madison county, and resides on his own farm three miles west of London.

OLD TIME TALKS CONTINUED

Here she first met Barton Blizzard, and after a short courtship they concluded to join hearts and hands, and share this world's sorrows and cares together. For that purpose they went to Esquire Thomas' clearing, and found his Honor out in the corn patch. He was immediately made known their intention, and in his homespun covered with cockleburrs and spanish needles, he did not for a moment hesitate to perform the pleasant ceremony. After several years of married life spent in Chillicothe and neighborhood, the couple settled on a clearing of 100 acres, bought of Billy Dunlap, situated between where Danville and Midway now stand, in sight of the present dwelling of David Haskell, in Range township. The price paid was \$1 per acre in trade. They afterwards bought land of Fulton, an old land jobber, at \$1 and \$1 50 per acre, and succeeded in acquiring 900 acres of land, the largest price paid being \$3 per acre to old Mr. Creighton.

The Indians, mostly Wyandots and Shawnees, were numerous then, and owned a great deal of the land. It was no uncommon thing to have a dirty copper face, come in the cabin, sit down by the open fireplace and smoke; and if they were not closely watched, they would steal whatever they could lay their hands upon. Squaws with papooses hung over their shoulders would frequently call, somestimes to sell beads, generally to beg for a camp in the neighborhood. The more charitable you were to the women, the more they would ask. Indians, as a rule, spent their time in hunting deer and turkeys, which were plenty. "I have stood in the door of my cabin and seen a half-dozen deer run by within 200 yards of me," said the old lady, "and my husband would often kill some five or six deer, take off their hides, and sell the dried hams in Chillicothe for 50 cents apiece. The remainder of the carcass we would keep for ourselves and neighbors. The meat was sweet, tender and juicy, and when cooked in butter, could not be excelled. The cornpiles near our cabin, were regular feeding grounds for wild turkeys, and it was an easy thing to shoot two or three without causing the flock to become frightened away.

"The wolves were our greatest enemies in destroying poultry and sheep. In fact, it was hardly worth while to try to raise sheep, these monsters were so ravenous and successful in their raids. At night a pack of them would come howling, snarling and snapping, within ten rods of the house."

"The cabin was built of logs and consisted of one room. Within were two beds, a few stools and what other furniture was really necessary. Corn was piled up in one corner, and dried meats hung from the rafters. Our farming implements were few. We would turn over the sod in the prairie, and plant our corn by "scratching up" or scraping the hole in the sod with a hoe, placing a few grains of corn in it and covering the seeds over. We did not raise much wheat, only enough to "flour us".

There being no grist mill near, we were compelled to take our corn and wheat to Springfield and have it ground on toll. In later years, Billy Wilson started a mill on Deercreek, and old Solomon Salmon of Fayette county owned a horse grist mill. He didn't have horses enough to run the mill, so the farmers brought their grain and worked their horses, until their meal was ground, giving him toll.
