Lucas, an old and honored surname, had its orgin in France whe e it was used as a personal name in ancient and mediaeval times. It s obtained from the Latin personal name Lucius which means "light." t become popular as a personal name in England after the Norman Conqu st in the 11th century and frequently was anglicized to Luke. In rece t centuries it has been used extensively as a surname.

William Lucas (1743-1814) was captain of Virginia troops durin the Revolutionary War. He was born in Virginia and died in Lucasvi le, Scioto County, Ohio which was named after his family.

Augustus Lucas, a Huguenot, fled from France some time between 1699 and 1704 and settled in Newport, Rhode Island. Unlike the gre t majority of refugees who abandoned all of their property and arrive penniless in foreign countries, he succeeded in escaping with his family and considerable wealth.

The first census of the United States, taken in 1790, has 20 listings of persons by the name of Lucas who were residents of Pennsylvania and heads of families at that time.

Seventy years later, the Federal Population Census of Ohio for the year 1860 contained 355 listings of persons by the name of Luca two of whom lived in Adams County. The latter were Susan Lucas, of Green Township, and M. C. Lucas, of Franklin Township.

One of the prominent and early settlers of Adams County was Joseph Lucas (1771-1808) who was the son of the above-mentioned Captain William Lucas and came to the Northwest Territory in 1797 with his brother, William, and located in Rush County which was the in Adams County but now is in Scioto County. Joseph Lucas was one of the three representatives from Adams County in the first legisle are of Ohio which was in session in Chillicothe from March 1, 1803 to A ril 15, 1803. At that session, Scioto County was organized and Joseph Lucas was one of its associate judges until his death. Another brower, Robert Lucas, was governor of Ohio from 1832 to 1836.

Daniel Bedinger Lucas (1836-1909) was U.S. Senator from West Virginia and later served as judge, Supreme Court of Appeals of the state.

Robert H. Lucas, (1888-1947), an attorney of note, practiced his profession in Louisville, Ky. during the early years of his career and later served as executive director of the Republican National Committee, with offices in Washington, D. C. for the 17 year period preceding his death.

Robert Elwood Lucas is president, Wilmington College, Wilmington, Ohio.

J. Robert Lucas is professor of mining and minerals engineering, Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Blacksburg, Va.
